#### Philosophy

#### PHIL 121 Introduction to Philosophy (3 credit, 3 lecture, 0 lab) IAI H4 900

Acquaints the student with the categories of and methods of philosophical inquiry, and surveys some major systems of philosophical thought from classical to contemporary times.

## PHIL 122 Fundamentals of Logic (3 credit, 3 lecture, 0 lab) IAI H4 906

Designed to develop a knowledge and understanding of the methods and principles used to distinguish correct from incorrect reasoning. Three areas are stressed: (1) the uses of language and fallacies, (2) deduction, and (3) induction. May be taken concurrently with PHIL 121.

### PHIL 221 Fundamentals of Ethics (3 credit, 3 lecture, 0 lab) IAI H4 904

Designed to investigate the nature of actions, the meaning of right and good, the principle ethical theories, and the organization of individual and social values from a philosophical perspective. <u>Pre-Requisite:</u> PHIL 121 or consent of the instructor.

# PHIL 224 Comparative Religions (3 credit, 3 lecture, 0 lab) IAI H5 904N

Comparison and investigation of contemporary and historical major Eastern and Western religions such as Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Taoism, Shintoism, Jainism, Judaism, and Islam. Examines philosophical, historical, social and political aspects.

#### PHIL 280 Selected Topics in Philosophy (3 credit, 3 lecture, 0 lab)

An in-depth study of selected problems or topics in philosophy. The exact content and instructional methodology will vary from semester to semester depending on the materials to be studied. A syllabus or course outline containing additional information will be available with pre-registration materials each time that the course is offered. This course may be repeated three times if different topics are considered, but cannot exceed a total of six (6) credit hours to3ward graduation and may be coffered as variable credit.
