Our Shawnee: Trigg Photograpgy

The Shawnee National Forest we know today is in large part due to the efforts of the Illinois Ozarks Reforestation Unit in 1931. Most of the promotional work was performed by newspaper publisher L.O. Trigg from Eldorado. Trigg took it upon himself to get southern Illinois' need for a forest noticed by the National Forest Commission. Our Shawnee: Trigg Photography Exhibit showcased annual excursions into the scenic areas of southern Illinois by the Ozark Tours of 1931 to 1949. This was made possible by photographer Charles Hammond of Eldorado. Hammond archives and curates the collection of photos and memorabilia of Trigg and his Ozark Tours. Hammond provided the photos for the exhibit including promotional items encased in a shadow box including some of Trigg's personal journals, advertisements, and tickets for tours. Local historian, Todd Carr, of Elizabethtown spoke about Trigg's personal life and his tours while discussing the pictures displayed in the gallery. 


Leap Day Tornado Memorial

The Southeastern Illinois College Math and Science Club has made great efforts to increase the amount of recycling done by students and faculty by using recycling bin stations around campus.
