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It was a great year at SIC! We have transitioned to a much closer sense of reality with more classes and activities back to a face-to-face schedule following a huge pivot to an online institution. This was a herculean effort taken on full force by the faculty and staff, and I couldn't be prouder of how we worked together to make this happen for our students. Aside from those pandemic efforts, we have exciting news to share regarding new donations, grants, a groundbreaking, awards and more.

SIC's finances continue to be on solid ground via the strong stewardship of the Board of Trustees and staff. Our Dr. Rice with family: Jacob, Connor, Lulabelle, Haley, and Megin. Four are SIC alumni.

Composite Financial Index (CFI score by the Department of Education and accrediting agencies) awarded SIC with the highest score we've seen in decades. While enrollment in higher education continues to fall nationally, this management is testament to making sure SIC remains strong to serve students tomorrow and well into the future. A significant way we've maintained strong finances and served students is via our alliance with Rend Lake

College whereby we share low enrollment academics and even staff. It's a model that has been featured in presentations at the Higher Learning Commission and the American Community College Trustees Association.

As for enrollment, the national statistics are alarming. Over one million students did not choose to enroll in higher education since the pandemic began. Add to that a demographic cliff of a shrinking high school population in the



nation and the shrinking of rural America, and the challenges remain stiff. Sadly, in many areas like ours, nearly half of the graduating seniors go nowhere after graduation—no college and no military. Only a handful enter the workforce. Many remain in a spiral of hopelessness. However, our new "Afternoon Academy CTE and Healthcare" programs for regional high school students has proven effective to combat that trend. Our "Fresh Start" scholarships for those young adults with little or no college beginning at age 25 have proven productive. And we have other exciting ventures to engage students and help them see the value of higher education.

Many of you ask me and staff on occasion if you can help in any way. Well, yes, you can

help us by spreading the good

news! If you know a young person who is debating whether or not to go to college, help them see the benefits of having a credential from a college like SIC. That will not only help SIC, but it will help our region and all of society.

Construction on the new Stanford D. Williams Career and Training Center in Carmi has begun! The complex, which has been dubbed the regional hub for career and workforce educational needs in the northern region of SIC's district, will be located to the north of the David L Stanley White County Center on SIC's Carmi extension site. The college

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anticipates two phases of the construction will be substantially completed near December 2023. State and local funds of around \$4.9 million will be combined with a \$505,667 gift from Williams to bring this long-awaited center to fruition. Curriculum will include welding, commercial driver's license, and auto/diesel programs, as well as introductory education to industrial trades.



Col. William C. Hise was indeed a great friend to the College, gifting us a regional art museum with operational endowment, but also kept us in his estate. His current estate gift will be approximately \$7+ million in addition to what he provided for the museum. While there are some restrictions on this gift, it will provide great benefits to SIC for generations to come. Breaking ground on the Stanford D. # A Title III grant valued at \$2.2 million was also awarded to SIC.

It comes with a matching endowment portion which will add another \$250,000 to our endowment at the end of the grant period. We hope that if you have not considered giving to SIC in the past or have not given recently, we sure could use the help in this dollar-for-dollar match—a great return on your contribution and a great benefit for our students. This grant also allowed us to hire five new positions to help with student retention efforts.

### SIC was awarded a \$1.4 million Upward Bound Grant by the Department of Education

to be spread out over five years. This grant will allow us to provide on-site college preparation for at-risk students in Carmi, Norris City, Gallatin County, Galatia, and Hardin Co. This fiveyear grant will allow us to employ two full-time employees.

An Illinois Tutoring Initiatives grant, supported with federal COVID-relief funds, was awarded to SIC through the Illinois Board of Higher Education and the Illinois Community College Board. This grant will support the learning and social emotional well-being of area K-12 students and allows SIC to hire several tutors.

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Students from local high schools around the area participated in the debut year of the ACE (Accelerated College Experience) program at SIC. ACE is designed to prepare academically talented students for the rigorous college application and scholarship process through service learning, test preparation, and communication training.


